


(pictured), 62, who was captured in Sudan in 1994 after years on the run, is already serving a life sentence for the murder of two French police officers in 1975. In a recent interview, he claimed to have killed up to 2,000 people in 100 attacks, but said that "only" about 10% of them were civilians. Asked in court to state his occupation, Ramírez, who claims to be a Palestinian citizen, replied: "Professional revolutionary... in the Leninist tradition."


